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BACKGROUND + METHODOLOGY

BACKGROUND

The research conducted by Morning Consult on behalf of the Bipartisan Policy Center seeks to understand:

- 1. Important factors that influence parents child care arrangement decisions
- 2. The child care arrangements used before and during COVID-19
- 3. Ideal child care arrangements before and during COVID-19
- 4. The impact of a COVID-19 vaccine on sending children back to a child care provider.

AUDIENCE

Survey respondents were screened on having a child at home under the age of 5.

For simplicity, throughout the report, this audience is referenced as 'parents.'

METHODOLOGY

The survey was conducted from December 11-16 2020 among a national sample of 1,500 parents with children under the age of 5. The interviews were conducted online and the data weighted to approximate a target sample of parents with children under the age of 5 based on age, gender, educational attainment, race, ethnicity, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

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Respondent Profile

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Maximum Difference Scaling (Max-Diff) is a discrete choice methodology which asks respondents to make a **series of forced choice responses about a larger list of like-type variables**. Through an experimental design and implementation we are able to mathematically assess the rank-ordering of these variables and, perhaps most importantly, assess the relative preference for each option.

Max-Diff data collection and analysis method is used to measure respondents' relative preferences for differing alternatives. Max-Diff measures statements competitively in a series of sets rather than individually in a list. This allows us to see trends in individual respondent preferences and determine which items are truly more vs. less important by forcing trade-offs.

Respondents were asked to rank the importance of the following factors when currently selecting a child care provider for their child(ren) under the age of 5:

- 1. Location of child care provider
- 2. Individualized attention provided to each child
- 3. Reviews/reputation of child care provider
- 4. Accreditation/licensing of child care provider
- 5. Quality caregivers and teachers
- 6. Safety/cleanliness/prevention of illness
- 7. Opportunities for cognitive development

KEY FINDINGS

MaxDiff Findings



Safety/cleanliness/prevention of illness is the most important factor to parents when selecting a child care provider for their youngest child during COVID-19, followed by quality caregivers and teachers, accreditation, reviews/reputation, and individualized attention.

• Safety/cleanliness/prevention of illness is estimated to be three times as important to parents as the average variable.

- Quality of caregivers is estimated to be twice as important as the average variable.
- 2 On the other hand, diversity of children and teachers across race, ethnicity, and ability levels, caregivers who look and/or sound like their family, location of provider, and bilingual educational opportunities were the least important factors when selecting a care provider during COVID-19.

· These factors were estimated to be half as important as average.



The importance of cost of care varies across demographic groups.


Parents with an annual income under \$50k, a lower level of education, parents in rural communities, and parents who live in the Midwest place more importance on the cost of care when selecting a child care provider during COVID-19.

MAXDIFF ANALYSIS

Safety/cleanliness/prevention of illness is the most important factor to parents when selecting a child care provider during COVID-19, followed by quality caregivers and teachers, accreditation of provider, reviews/reputation of provider, and individualized attention provided to each child.

Average MaxDiff Utility Scores for various attributes (relative preference of each item); if an attribute has a score of 100, parents of young children are equally as likely to say that's the most important attribute; a score of 200 means they will select it twice as often as average, a score of 50 means they will select it half as often as average.



While safety/cleanliness/prevention is the most important factor to men and women, it is more important to women than it is to men when selecting a care provider.

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KEY FINDINGS

Child Care Arrangements Before & During COVID-19



Whether parents were paying for child care in January 2020 differs significantly by income level.

- Forty-five percent of parents were paying for child care entirely themself in January 2020, while 39% did not pay for child care or receive government assistance for child care.
- Parents with an income over \$75k are much more likely than parents of other income groups to be paying for child care entirely themselves.



The child care arrangement parents use for their youngest child were minimally impacted by COVID-19.

- Excluding Head Start programs, a majority of parents are currently using the same child care arrangement they were using in January 2020.
- Some key changes across demographic groups include parents across ethnicity groups providing care for their child at a higher rate in December 2020 than they did in January 2020. And, 2 in 5 parents currently provide care for their child under 1, a 7% increase from January 2020.




The type of child care arrangement used differs significantly across demographic groups. Some key differences include:

- Parents with an income over \$75k are twice as likely as parents of other income levels to be using a child care center affiliated with a faith-based organization in January and December 2020.
- Rural and suburban parents are much more likely than urban parents to personally provide care for their youngest child in January and December 2020.
- Urban parents were more likely to rely on a child care center affiliated with a faith-based organization for their child care arrangement than suburban and rural parents in January and December 2020.

CHILD CARE ARRANGEMENTS BEFORE & DURING COVID-19

Forty-five percent of parents were paying for child care entirely themself in January 2020, while 39% did not pay for child care or receive government assistance for child care.




Current Child Care Provider Among Those Who Were Using Provider In January 2020

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



Which of the following best describe the primary child care arrangement you used in **January 2020** for your youngest child?




Among child care arrangements not used as frequently, there were not significant changes across income levels between January and December 2020.



















Ideal Child Care Arrangements Before & During COVID-19



- Before and during COVID-19, parents report using their ideal child care arrangement for their youngest child.
- Similarly, a majority of parents using a formal child care arrangement in December 2020, excluding part-day Pre-K, reported the child care arrangement they are using currently would be their ideal current care arrangement for their youngest child.



A plurality of parents say their ideal child care arrangement before and during COVID-19 is providing care themselves. However, this differs across demographic groups.

- Parents with an income over \$75k remain half as likely as parents of lower income levels to say their ideal child care arrangement would be providing care themselves.
- There was a 9% increase among Black parents and other parents of color between January and December 2020 who say their ideal child care arrangement is to provide care themselves for their youngest child.
- Rural parents are more likely than suburban and urban parents to indicate their ideal child care arrangement in January and December 2020 is providing care themselves.



Ideal child care arrangements differs by the age of parents' youngest child.

- Parents with a younger child are more likely to say providing care themselves is their ideal child care arrangement in January and December 2020.















Important Factors For Selecting Child Care Before & During COVID-19



- Cleanliness/prevention of illness (52%) and trust in child care provider (51%) were the most important factors to parents when selecting a child care arrangement in January 2020.
- These remained the most important factors when selecting a child care arrangement during COVID-19.



Across demographic groups, cleanliness/prevention of illness and trust in child care provider were the most important factors to parents when selecting a child care arrangement in January and December 2020. Key differences across demographic groups include:

- Parents with a lower income level are more likely to say cleanliness/prevention of illness and cost of care were important factors when choosing a child care arrangement in January 2020 and December 2020.
- Parents who are Black/other are more likely than Hispanic and white parents to say cleanliness and prevention of illness was an important factor when choosing a care arrangement in January 2020 and December 2020.



While a third of parents (35%) say they <u>did not</u> have to compromise on their child care arrangement in January 2020, a fifth said they had to compromise on cost of care (23%), flexible hours (22%), location (18%), and qualification of caregivers and teachers (17%).

• Parents using a formal child care arrangement are more likely than parents using an informal child care arrangement to say they had to compromise when selecting a care arrangement in January 2020.





What is the maximum amount you/your household can afford to pay per child for child care each week?



- Half of parents (48%) say the COVID-vaccine being available to child care workers, everyone in their community, or their household would cause them to consider a different child care arrangementt.
- The vaccination of child care workers (38%), people in their community (37%), and household members (36%) receiving the vaccine having an equal impact on parents considering a different child care arrangement.



The child care arrangements parents are currently using affects the impact a vaccine has on considering a different child care arrangement.

- Parents currently using a child care center affiliated with a faith-based organization (70%), a family child care home (74%), and Head Start program (73%) are most likely to say a COVID-19 vaccine would cause them to consider a different child care arrangement.
- On the other hand, parents using informal child care arrangements, such as providing care themselves (32%) or relying on a relative (28%) are less likely to say a COVID-19 would cause them to consider a different child care arrangement.




















