## BACKGROUND

The research conducted by Morning Consult on behalf of the Bipartisan Policy Center sought to understand the following:

1. Reasons why employed parents choose informal child care
2. Circumstances for using informal child care including flexibility and multiple children
3. Interest and barriers in using formal child care
4. Community responsibility for providing child care

## AUDIENCE

Survey respondents were screened on having a child ages 0-5, all parents of the household being currently employed, and currently using an informal child care provider. For simplicity, this audience is referred to as parents.

## METHODOLOGY

This poll was conducted between May 19-24, 2022, among a sample of 1,000 parents who have a child ages o-5, currently employed, and currently using an informal child care provider. The interviews were conducted online. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

## DEFINITION

Throughout the analysis formal child care refers to a child care center, family child care home, pre$K$, and a head start program, while informal child care refers to child care from relatives, parents, non-relative friend/neighbor, or a nanny

## PARENT SURVEY SERIES

BPC and Morning Consult have conducted a series of parent surveys to understand parents' need and preferences for child care.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Consistent with previous polling, safety, and trust are the most important factors to parents as they think about their child care arrangement which could be driving their preference for an informal child care arrangement. In open-end questions, distrust in formal child care, trust in family members to provide the best care, and safety are leading factors in why informal child care is their preferred arrangement. See slides 8, 9, and 23.
2. Parents need child care arrangements that are available over the weekends and during non-traditional work hours to accommodate their unpredictable work schedules. A quarter of parents are aware of their work schedule two weeks in advance or less, and a quarter need child care outside of traditional work hours and during the weekends so that they and/or their spouse/partner can work during those times. In an open-end question, some parents describe their formal care options as limited, and among parents who prefer a formal child care arrangement, local availability and hours were both listed as reasons they do not currently use a formal child care arrangement. See slides 11, 16, 17, 26 and 27
3. Parents are satisfied with their informal child care arrangements and most say formal child care arrangements are unappealing to them. A plurality of parents would prefer their current arrangement even if child care were free and in a convenient location. Parents who are personally providing care or alternating with their spouse are least likely to be satisfied with their current child care arrangement and prefer a formal child care arrangement. A majority of parents say formal child care arrangements are unappealing (62\%) rather than inaccessible (38\%) to them, but low-income and minority parents are particularly likely to say it is inaccessible to them. See slides 19, 21, 22, and 30.
4. Cost is frequently referenced as a barrier to using a formal child care arrangement. Cost may be seen as such a large barrier to using a formal child care arrangement because a majority of parents (55\%) do not currently pay for their child care arrangement, and this number is even higher among parents using relatives for child care (67\%). Among parents who would prefer to use a formal child care arrangement or used to use a formal child care arrangement and stopped, cost of care is the main reason they do not use formal child care. Additionally, nearly half ( $48 \%$ ) of parents would be likely to consider sending their child to a formal child care arrangement if it was affordable and within their budget. See slides 15, 24, and 33.
5. COVID-19 has influenced how parents think about the safety of their child at child care and created more flexibility in their work arrangements. Concerns about COVID-19 and the ability to work from home or have more control over their work hours are referenced in why parents prefer to use informal child care and why they stopped using a formal child care arrangement. See slides 8, 24 and 26.

Over half of parents (68\%) are using parent-provided care as their primary child care arrangement for their youngest child.

Which of the following best describes which relative is responsible for your primary child care? (among parents using relatives, $n=246$ )


- A quarter of parents (25\%) use relatives as their primary child care arrangement for their youngest child. Among those who use relatives as their primary child care provider, $80 \%$ say grandparents are responsible for the care.
- Older parents are more likely than younger parents and rural parents are more likely than urban parents to use relatives as their primary child care provider. See appendix slide 39.
- Black and parents of other ethnic groups are more likely than white and Hispanic parents to personally provide care for their child, while white and Hispanic parents are more likely to use relatives. See appendix slide 39.
- Parents with older children are more likely to personally be providing care. See appendix slide 40.

Across the different types of informal child care arrangements parents are currently using, safety and trust are the two most important aspects of the items tested. Location is an especially important aspect to those who are currently using a friend/nanny/neighbor for child care (97\%).

## Nearly half of parents who have a service/retail occupation (45\%) are aware of their work schedule two weeks in advance or less.



- Overall, a quarter of parents (28\%) are aware of their work schedule two weeks in advance or less, while nearly half (44\%) have a fixed work schedule and $16 \%$ make their own schedule. See appendix slide 42.
- Awareness of work schedule differs significantly across demographic groups including income and occupation.

Among those with a household income under $\$ 50 \mathrm{k}, 40 \%$ are aware of their work schedule two weeks in advance or less, compared to $25 \%$ with an income of $\$ 50 k-\$ 100 k$, and $11 \%$ with an income of $\$ 100 k+$. See appendix slide 42.

- Across occupation classification, $45 \%$ of parents who have a service/retail occupation, $28 \%$ who have a trade/skill occupation, and $28 \%$ who have a health care occupation are aware of their work schedule two weeks in advance or less.

A fifth of parents who are using relatives for child care say they moved close to family members so they could provide child care (21\%) or that family members changed their work arrangement (21\%) to provide child care.

- Parents living in an urban community are more likely than those living in a rural community to have personally moved ( $19 \%$ urban, $14 \%$ rural) or had family members move closer ( $11 \%$ urban, $6 \%$ rural) so they could provide child care. See appendix slide 43.
- Parents who are salaried ( $47 \%$ ) are more likely than those who are hourly ( $39 \%$ ) to have made one of the tested changes in order to provide child care. See appendix slide 43.
- There are no significant differences in the percent selected across age, income, and ethnicity

CIRCUMStances for informal child care
Four-in-five ( $79 \%$ ) parents who have more than one child ages o-5 say this influences their current child care arrangement, and are most likely to reference cost as an influential factor.

$40 \%$ of parents who say having more than one child influences their current child care arrangement specifically referenced cost or money as an influential factor.

- Cost
- "The cost of care for 2 kids is literally more than I make, so any time there is a conflict where we can't arrange care via family, I have to cut work."
. "It is hard to work with both, but we cannot afford two in daycare."
-"I am not able to afford daycare for 1 child much less, multiple children."
- "I have a 3 and 4-year-old. I had to drastically reduce my work hours, drop my position at work due to costs of child care for 2 kids. It wasn't worth me paying for 2 kids at daycare, wouldn't make enough working than it cost."
- More complicated
- "Can their grandparents handle more than one little monster at a time."
- "It is very hard to find places that take two not potty-trained babies."
- "The grandparent is obviously getting older so it would be up to him to decide whether he could care for multiple kids."
- Difficult to find care
- "They would need to go to the same place and sometimes it is hard to find a pace that will have room for both in my experience."
-"I would need to consider if my mother is physically able to care for a future newborn plus my current toddler in order for me to keep working."
- "It makes things more hectic and harder to find daycare that has two open slots."

## fLexibility of informal child care

 Parents need child care during traditional work hours (64\%), during the weekends (26\%), and outside oftraditional work hours ( $23 \%$ ). Urban ( $28 \%$ ), hourly employees ( $27 \%$ ), trade/skilled workers ( $32 \%$ ), and health care workers (28\%) are most likely to need care outside of traditional work hours. For weekend child care, urban adults (31\%), hourly employees (30\%), and service workers (37\%) are most likely to need care during this time. See appendix slides 45 and 46 .

INTEREST IN FORMAL CARE
Overall, a strong majority of parents (93\%) are satisfied with their current child care arrangement, including $65 \%$ who say they are very satisfied.

## interest in formal care

If child care were free and in a convenient location, parents are divided on what type of arrangement they would most prefer for their youngest child with a majority (57\%) preferring an informal arrangement.

If child care were free and in a convenient location for your family, what type of child care arrangement would you most prefer for your youngest child?


- A plurality of parents would prefer their current arrangement even if child care were free and in a convenient location. This preference is strongest for relative (46\%) and non-live-in nanny care (44\%). Across current types of child care, about two-fifths would prefer a formal child care arrangement. See slide 22.
- Rural parents (24\%) are more likely than urban (17\%) and suburban (17\%) parents to most prefer relative care. See appendix slide 47.
- Low-income parents (46\%) are more likely than middle (38\%) and high-income parents (40\%) to prefer a formal child care arrangement. See appendix slide 47.

White (21\%) and Hispanic (23\%) parents are more likely than Black (12\%) and adults of other ethnicity groups (18\%) to prefer relatives for child care. See appendix slide 47.

- Parents with older children are slightly more likely to prefer a formal child care arrangement. See appendix slide 48.
- When asked why parents selected their preferred child care arrangement, trust in care and quality time with family members are reasons why parents prefer an informal arrangement, whereas a structured learning environment and the development of social skills are reasons why parents prefer a formal arrangement. See slide 23.

Over a third ( $38 \%$ ) of parents have used a formal child care arrangement before and reference a variety of reasons they stopped using formal care including cost, COVID-19, preference, and change in their work arrangement.

Have you used a formal child care arrangement before?


- Parents with a higher income level ( $\$ 100 \mathrm{k}+, 46 \%$ ) are more likely than those of lower-income levels (under \$50k: 35\%, \$50k-\$100k: 38\%) to have used a formal child care arrangement before. See appendix slide 50.
- Parents in the West coast (33\%) are less likely than parents from other regions to have used formal child care before. See appendix slide 50.
- Parents with older children (ages 2-3: 42\%, ages 4-5: 43\%) are more likely than parents with a child ages $0-1$ (32\%) to say they have used a formal child care arrangement before. See appendix slide 51.
- Among parents who say they would prefer to use formal care, nearly half ( $46 \%$ ) have used a formal arrangement before compared to those who would prefer informal child care, $33 \%$ have used a formal arrangement before. See appendix slide 51.

- Rural parents are especially likely to say all of the tested child care options are limited in their community, followed by suburban and urban parents.

Parents in the Midwest and South regions are more likely than parents in the Northeast and West regions to say all of the tested child care options are limited in their community.

BARRIERS TO FORMAL CHILD CARE
Two thirds of parents ( $67 \%$ ) say their home is less than a 10-mile one-way drive from a formal child care arrangement.

Approximately how many miles is a one-way drive from your home to a formal child care arrangement?


- Less than a third of rural parents (29\%) say a one-way drive from their home to a formal child care arrangement is less than 5 miles, compared to urban (42\%) and suburban (42\%) parents.
- Across regions, parents in the South (32\%) are least likely to say their home is less than a 5 mile one-way drive to a formal child care arrangement, while parents in the northeast (49\%) are most likely.

A majority of parents (62\%) say formal child care arrangements are unappealing to them, while other say the arrangements are inaccessible (38\%) to them.

- Cost and lack of trust are leading reasons why formal child care arrangements are unappealing to parents.
- Many parents say they prefer the care of a relative or to take care of the children themselves.
- Others site concerns about the safety and quality of care, including poorly trained staff, COVID concerns, and negative reputations.

Cost is also a leading reason why formal arrangements are inaccessible to parents. Other reasons include:

- Distance to arrangement/inconvenient location
- Incompatible hours
- Lack of transportation
- Ineligibility for programs
- Long waitlists
- Lack of information about options

Low-income parents are more likely than middle and high-income parents to say formal arrangements are inaccessible to them. Additionally, non-white parents are more likely than white parents to say formal arrangements are inaccessible to them.

Parents who are currently using a relative or friend/neighbor/nanny for child care are more likely than those personally providing care with their spouse/partner to say formal child care arrangements are unappealing to them.

## Three in five parents ( $61 \%$ ) say their taxes do not help fund formal child care options in their community.

Which of the following best describes your perspective, even if neither is exactly correct?


- Nearly half of urban parents (49\%) say their taxes help fund formal child care options in their local community, compared to suburban (37\%) and rural (34\%) adults. See appendix slide 61.
- Parents in the Northeast (48\%) are also especially likely to say their taxes help fund formal child care options in their local community, compared to parents in the Midwest (39\%), South (35\%) and West (39\%) regions. See appendix slide 61.
- Democrats (42\%) are more likely than Republicans (37\%) to say their taxes help fund formal child care options in their local community. See appendix slide 61.

RESPONSIBILITY OF CHILD CARE

## A strong majority of parents say parents (86\%) are responsible for financing child care, but are divided on how responsible state (52\%) and local (50\%) governments are for financing.

Of the options tested, parents are least likely to say employers ( $38 \%$ ) and businesses ( $31 \%$ ) are responsible for financing child care. See appendix slide 62.

Democrat parents are especially likely to say state ( $63 \%$ ) and local ( $61 \%$ ) governments are responsible for financing child care compared to independent and Republican parents.

- Urban parents are especially likely to say state (59\%) and local (57\%) governments are responsible for financing child care compared to independent and Republican parents.
- Rural parents are less likely than urban and suburban parents to say employers (33\%) and businesses ( $25 \%$ ) are responsible for financing child care.

Parents that are administrative workers, office professionals, and executive/senior level managers are especially likely to say all of the tested entities are responsible for financing child care compared to parents in other industries. See appendix slides 62 and 63.

Half of parents (54\%) say child care is a parent's responsibility, but two in five (41\%) say it is a shared responsibility between the public and parents. Perspectives vary by demographic.

Child care is a parent's responsibility


- Republican parents (66\%) are especially likely to say child care is a parent's responsibility compared to independent (56\%) and Democrat (40\%) parents.
- Rural parents (57\%) are more likely than suburban (54\%) and urban (51\%) parents to say child care is a parent's responsibility compared to a shared responsibility between the public and parents.
- Over half of parents in the South (58\%) and West (56\%) regions say child care is a parent's responsibility.
- Service workers (38\%) and trade and skilled workers (29\%) are less likely than parents in other industries to say child care is a shared responsibility.
