




Percent of Children Living in Poverty (36,444) by Age




In 2020, there were 5,560 child care workers in Kansas. This is a 5% increase in the number of child care workers from 2019 and a 12% decline since 2016. In 2020, the annual mean salary for child care workers was \$22,670. In Kansas, 36% of young children do not have access to formal child care.



Number of Child Care Workers: 5-Year Trend¹⁷




Child Care Worker Annual Salary (2019) \$22,670^{18,19}



Child Care Supply Gap²³

In Kansas, 153,290 children have the potential need for child care. There is a supply of 98,820 child care slots. The families of 54,470 children do not have access to child care. The child care gap is 35.5% of the potential need (children with working parents).
