

# Children and **Families**

There are 433,421 children ages 5 and under in Massachusetts.

While 70% of children ages 5 and under live in households in which all parents work, 13% of all children in this age group live in families below the poverty line (\$21,960).<sup>1</sup>






### Percent of Children Living in Poverty (57,210) by Age

# Child Care **Funding**


Quality early care and learning programs contribute to both thriving economies and healthy families.

# **Child Care Providers**


In 2020, there were 11,480 child care workers in Massachusetts. This is a 18% decline in the number of child care workers from 2019 and a 9% decline since 2016. In 2020, the annual mean salary for child care workers was \$33,120.16 In Massachusetts, 34% of young children do not have access to formal child care.



#### **Number of Child Care Workers:** 5-Year Trend<sup>17</sup>




### Child Care Worker Annual Salary (2019) \$33,12018,19



### Child Care Supply Gap<sup>23</sup>

In Massachusetts, 305,790 children have the potential need for child care. There is a supply of 202,440 child care slots. The families of 103,350 children do not have access to child care. The child care gap is 33.8% of the potential need (children with working parents).
