Public Opinion on the Opioid Crisis

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#### BACKGROUND

The research conducted by Morning Consult on behalf of the Bipartisan Policy Center sought to understand the following:

- 1. General views of the misuse of opioids in the United States
- 2. The personal impact of opioid addiction
- 3. Sentiment towards Congress' response to the opioid crisis

#### **METHODOLOGY**

This poll was conducted between May 17-19, 2022 among a sample of 2,210 adults. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of adults based on gender, age, race, educational attainment, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of  $\pm$ 0.

#### **DEFINITION**

The following information was provided to respondents about opioids:

As you may know, **opioids** are drugs that produce a variety of effects, including relaxation and relief from pain. Opioids can be prescription medications (Morphine, Oxycodone, hydrocodone) and illegal or synthetic drugs (heroin, fentanyl). Opioids can be abused when used outside of prescribed parameters.

**Opioid use disorder** (also commonly referred to as **opioid addiction**) is a problematic pattern of opioid use that causes significant impairment or distress.

The larger issue of opioid abuse and addiction in the United States is sometimes referred to as the **opioid crisis**.

### What U.S. Adults Think About The Opioid Crisis

61%

Of adults consider the misuse of opioids in the United States to be a major public health emergency, including a bipartisan majority of adults (66% Democrats, 57% independents, 59% Republicans).


Of adults recognize the **opioid crisis as a major problem in the United States** but are less likely to recognize it as a major problem in their state (53%) and community (36%).

58%

Of adults think Congress is not doing enough to combat the opioid crisis, including a bipartisan majority of adults (62% Democrats, 54% independents, 58% Republicans).


Three in five adults (61%) consider the misuse of opioids in the United States to be a major public health emergency.

A bipartisan majority of adults consider the misuse of opioids in the United States to be a major public health emergency.


Do you consider the misuse of opioids in the United States to be a public health emergency?


A majority of adults (61%) living in an urban community think the opioid crisis is a major problem in urban communities.

A third (37%) of adults know someone who has been directly impacted by opioid addiction, and 15% say they have been directly impacted by opioid addiction.


Have you or someone you know been directly impacted by opioid addiction?



Millennials (25%), adults in urban communities (21%), and those who are currently unemployed (21%) are especially likely to say they have been directly impacted by opioid addiction.


A third of adults think it would be difficult to find care for opioid addiction that is affordable (36%) and effective (31%).

Do you think Congress is doing enough or not doing enough to combat the opioid crisis?


