

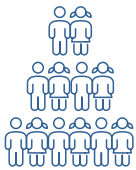
There are **307,868** children under age 5 in Wisconsin, comprising **5%** of the state's total population. An additional **10%** of the state's population, approximately **622,986** children, are between the ages of 5 and 13.



**276,610** children under 5 with a potential need for formal child care



**171,050** formal child care spots in licensed registered programs



**104,960** children left without a formal child care spot

Wisconsin is at risk of losing between

**\$4,819,951,121 - \$7,329,810,244**

in lost household income, decreased business productivity, and forgone tax revenue over the next 10 years due to the **37.90%** child care gap.

### CCDF Eligibility

Income ≤ 57% SMI
